



COMMUNITY OUTREACH

PCOM'S Office of Admissions hosts several Pathway initiatives that target underrepresented minorities in medicine.

PCOM's Middle School Science Enrichment Program (PMSEP) is offered to middle school students from Philadelphia and the surrounding area. This program is designed to influence young people in the region to choose a career in the health professions through early exposure.

PCOM's Future Healthcare Scholars Program is designed for students who have an interest in healthcare professions. The program builds on their curiosity through interactive learning experiences, workshops, campus visits, college readiness preparation and mentorship opportunities that encourage students to pursue a career in healthcare.

PCOM's Health Professions Recruitment and Exposure Program (HPREP) exposes students to science-related activities while introducing them to careers in the health professions at PCOM. This program stimulates academic and scientific interest in high school students from the Philadelphia and surrounding area.

PCOM dedicates annual scholarships specifically for underrepresented minority students. In 2017, the PCOM Board of Trustees dedicated scholarships for Hispanic students. Scholarships are available for students who identify as first-generation medical student, minority women, minority students including African American, Native American, Hispanic, Puerto Rican Mainlander, and Mexican American. Scholarships are also awarded to students who commit to serve underserved communities and the LGBTQ community.

PCOM OPPORTUNITIES SUMMER ACADEMY

The Office of Diversity and Community Relations hosts the annual PCOM Science and Math Summer Academy, a partnership with high schools in Philadelphia that serve minority, low-income, and first generation students. Launched in 2016, this two-week intensive program has introduced over 250 students to careers in STEM+M — science, technology, engineering, math, and medicine.

In summer 2019, the Office of Diversity and Community Relations and Division of Research partnered with Cabrini University, an emerging Hispanic-serving Institution, to launch the inaugural African American and Hispanic Male Undergraduate Research initiative. Studies show that African American and Hispanic males are under represented in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) educational programs and careers. Additionally, this population is also under represented in clinical psychology. Existing research has suggested that a lack of access to advanced science courses and professional environments could be one reason for the disparity. Since its inception, our program has offered opportunities for over 10 African American and Hispanic male undergraduate science and psychology majors at Cabrini University to engage in research at PCOM.

COMMUNITY WELLNESS INITIATIVE (CWI)

The Community Wellness Initiative (CWI) was created in June 2021 by the president to support existing projects and foster cross-campus collaboration to create,
